Governance Updates: Right Relations, Objectivity and Financial Sustainability Inform Board's Work

At last year's retreat, the Ferry Beach board began to explore what it means to be a not for profit organization that operates 365 days a year. The board renewed its commitment to our Unitarian Universalist principles and values by choosing seven words that guided our work. These are: community, compassion, respect, truth, conscience, worth and acceptance. At the center of all of our values, is Love. Right relations, objectivity and financial sustainability were adopted as yardsticks to inform our decision making. These same three ideas will help us as we begin to engage in a strategic planning process for the organization.

Roadmaps are always important when you are on a journey! Many not for profit organizations spend a lot of time reacting to situations as they arise instead of planning for their future. Ferry Beach Board is undertaking a strategic planning process at its February board retreat. Using an outside facilitator from Portland, Maine, the board is reviewing our financial health as well as our commitment to our mission and legacy in our work.

The board will be looking at updating the language of our mission statement at its next retreat, knowing that our planning and our mission go hand in hand. We hope

to have a longer report at the Annual Meeting!

Remember that our Annual Meeting is Saturday, June 21st at 11am in Rowland Hall on the Ferry Beach Campus.

President's Message (from Paul Provencher)

In the Spring Discovery newsletter, we shared with you our commitment as a board to address all of our work with three key ideas: 1) Right relations, 2) objective and rational search for truth and 3) financial sustainability for Ferry Beach.

In the last five years, we have accomplished a great deal as a community. We have successfully raised funds and built a brand new dining hall; we set four cabins (the Metz Village cabins and the nurses' cabin) on foundations; remodeled bathrooms in a couple of dorms; we shored up our dunes on the beach; we successfully transitioned our staff leadership and we negotiated one of our long-term vendor contracts. We also began bringing in approximately \$40,000 in donated dollars annually through sustaining memberships.

As a board, we continue to address our long-term needs by monitoring our finances. We have begun the process of revisiting and re-envisioning our mission. We have renewed our promise as an organization to live by our values. In our board retreat last year, we affirmed that our central value was love. From the UU principles we highlighted these seven values to affirm in our organization: community, acceptance, worth, conscience, truth, respect and compassion. Our staff and program committee will be monitoring

how we are living these values through our collective work.

Below, I share with you some of the information we began to explore that helps us think about the financial sustainability of Ferry Beach. The use numbers and our revenue represent some of some of the challenges we will be exploring as a board at our retreat and taking into the planning process this February.

As your board, we are dedicated to living the values of our UU principles and our mission. Through our governance work we are rededicating ourselves to our mission and values as Ferry Beach. We want to assure the financial sustainability of Ferry Beach for many years to come. We know that the path in which we currently travel is not financially sustainable and we must look at new ways to use our precious resources of 32 acres and 19 buildings on the beach in Saco, Maine!

We look forward to sharing with you our work as a board to re-affirm our mission, create a strategic plan and vision to guide us in the coming years and use this wonderful resource in service to our widening community, our mission and our legacy.

Time on Mission: Addressing Financial Stability


Our legacy at Ferry Beach is the universalist message of Love. Universal salvation was and still is a controversial idea in many organized religions. Yet, when you "Google" 'resurgence of universalism,' there are a lot of people and organizations sharing this inspiring spiritual truth in today's world.

Quillen Shinn was a Universalist. Raised in the southern traditions of evangelical spiritualism, Shinn brought that same fervor to his passion for Universalism. Ferry Beach was one of his most successful Universalist outposts.

While our campus is open 239 days of the year, the main work we do in service to our mission is limited to 79 days in the summer. As you can see from the charts that accompany this article, the summer conferences are a third of the available time that Ferry Beach is open and provide 60% of our resources.

Our tenant, the Ecology School occupies 114 weekdays and shares the campus on the weekends with churches and other outside groups that rent the Ferry Beach campus for an additional 46 days.



challenge us, even if all of the dormitories and sleeping spaces were winterized.

However, over the years, Ferry Beach, in part in service to our tenant, has created more and more warm spaces. A few years ago when the Metz Village was created, the three cabins and the nurses' cabins were winterized and set on foundations. The Kelly Cottage and 5 Morris are heated year round and soon, there will be spaces available in the winterized home that used to belong to Ray Hopkins. Space heaters in the dorms have been replaced by wall heaters in the hallways and in the Dolphin Room and the GAYLA Theater.

Of course, the beautiful new DeWolfe Dining Hall which is heated, allows us to think more about how we can use the small heated spaces we have in service to our mission and helps us consider how we can stretch our season.

While heating our dorms, the cabins, cottages and DeWolfe has made our campus safer, it has also made it more comfortable for our tenant and the churches on the weekends. However, it has added greatly to the cost of operating Ferry Beach in the off season.



Part of the challenge we have is to think about is how we can successfully be in service to our mission and at the same time, raise enough revenue to create the kinds of programs and services that would



make Quillen Shinn proud. Extending our hands and hearts to others, in service to the message of Universalism and Love is our legacy. Our opportunities await our creativity and our passion.

Physical Plant Challenges

We heard you this summer! The back wash-houses in the Grove are seriously in need of some tender loving care! We are planning this winter/spring to do some sprucing up to both the men's and women's bathrooms. While we won't be able to make major structural changes, we will be looking at how we can best address some of the problems with the bathrooms this last summer.

We also understand the concerns regarding the changes to the Grove campsite numbering system. Our intention was to give more space to campers and consolidate all of the trailers to one area of the Grove. We still have some improvements we will be making to campsites before campers come back to the Grove this summer.

The Rose Pavilion is also in need of serious attention, but we don't believe we will be able to get to it until at least 2015 or beyond. We are looking at what the city of Saco will allow when it comes to upgrades we would like to make on the Pavilion. Several people have stepped up to ask about the Rose Pavilion and are considering making a donation to address the problem. If we are able to do something sooner, we will let you know.

Plans for the house that belonged to Ray Hopkins are in the very infancy stages of development. We are looking at what it would take to shore up the existing home and create five small rooms with private baths in the space. We will be sharing more about this as information becomes available to us.
