## Inching Forward on the Dune Restoration Plan

Winter storms are always the most challenging for Ferry Beach and Camp Ellis. With the jetty that separates the beach from the mouth of the Saco River, erosion occurs. Many believe that the energy of the waves that roll into the jetty and head to shore, pick up momentum and speed. This energy, because it is more concentrated and not dispersed (because of the jetty), causes major deterioration of the beach. Homes in Camp Ellis have been disappearing with each winter storm and the railroad tracks and street that used to lead from Camp Ellis to Ferry Beach are no more.

For Ferry Beach, we have seen the deterioration of the sand dunes and the shrinking of the beach for years.

The Army Corps of Engineers, who completed the first jetty in the 1850's and have extended it many times, have proposed a solution, and last spring, we heard that the idea was nearing an implementation phase. Then the Department of Environmental Protection decided that part of the solution, to place additional sand from Camp Ellis to Ferry Park Avenue and raise the beach 9 feet higher than high tide, would be detrimental to two shore birds, the Piping Plover and the Red Knot.

A series of steps were taken, a report and policy for the city of Saco to adopt

was created by the Saco
Shoreline Commission
regarding the shore birds
and now we are poised
once again to move
forward.

A bill to streamline the permitting process to address estoration has passed the state legislatur

beach restoration has passed the state legislature and was signed by the governor.

Federal officials feel that the work of the city of Saco, the state and others around the issues of wildlife management has helped. Signals from federal officials seem to indicate that the actions regarding the protection of specific shore birds have addressed their concerns. No date has been set for the project to commence. The challenge still will be to address some of the particulars of adding sand to the beach to raise the dunes.

The point that many wildlife and environmentalists made in the hearings at the state legislature was that without adding sand to the beach, Piping Plovers and other birds cannot

nest as there are very few dune areas left in the southern strip of beach.

Ferry Beach continues to monitor this important issue. The Saco Shoreline Commission meets monthly at our facilities at Ferry Beach.

After seeing the underneath deterioration of the Quillen Porch, he talked to our Director of Operations about coming back to Ferry Beach to address the challenge. He told us if we could find the materials to do the job, he would come back with a crew.

Paul Belyea a GAYLA conference goer, loved the Quillen and was grateful he could donate the money needed to fix the porch. So with materials in hand, Chip will go to work the week before work week starts.

Chip is no stranger to volunteering. He was instrumental in creating a fundraising sleep out in March for a program which helps homeless youth and adults.

Chip will be here the week before Work Week starts. He'll work with his 3 crew members and some of the UU youth from his church. He explained about the project: "I will be coming a week early to do planning demolition, and support to remove floor framing. I will be staying through Wednesday of work week before going to GA to coordinate with whomever comes to help. I

am hoping to be ready with floor framing done or underway by the time work week starts. We will need some carpentry-ready folks to re-install the deck during work week, and possibly some to do framing of the deck. There will be finish details for the railings and posts to do - reattaching, possibly rebuilding, possible re-installation of posts. As I'm leaving before the end of work week, I'll need someone to coordinate the end of the project. I think I have someone lined up from my congregation who is coming for work week for coordination, but it wouldn't hurt to have another person."

If you have the skills that Chip will need to finish the project, consider coming to Ferry Beach during work week to help.

## Membership Has Its Privileges

Ferry Beach Park Association is a not for profit, membership organization. When incorporated and applying for 501c3 status with the federal government, not for profits can be organized with or without members other than the board of directors.

When Ferry Beach was incorporated, many years ago, it chose to have members in addition to the board. Membership in Ferry Beach is one of the ways in which people use the facility and support the future of the organization. Members also have the responsibility to elect the board of directors, amend articles and bylaws, and vote on other matters that properly come before the members at an annual meeting. Ferry Beach, like other broader membership organizations, has an annual meeting so that members may participate at this level of governance for the organization.

As a not for profit, Ferry Beach has an elected board of directors. This is the group responsible for policy making for the organization and hiring of an Executive Director who is responsible for day to day operations.

One of the privileges of membership of Ferry Beach is that members can come to a conference or workshop. They may attend the annual meeting and other events sponsored by Ferry Beach. Members of Ferry Beach are invited to be a part of a community of people who support the values of Ferry Beach.

In the not for profit world, members are an essential part of our tax-exempt status because members help us fulfill our by-laws. The founders of Ferry Beach who helped form the corporation, created a membership broader than just the required board of directors so that there would always be people who acted as good stewards of the organization's assets. A big part of the responsibilities of membership is to assure that Ferry Beach will be here for generations to come.

Members in not-for-profit organizations often provide volunteer services as well as give financial donations to the organization. Members help support the initiatives that help sustain the organization. In many not for profits that are spiritually based, self-less service is a key component of the culture of the organization.

Stewardship is a part of membership. Of approximately 1700 members from last year, 780 of those are life members, which means at one time or another in the past, they gave a larger gift to Ferry Beach in exchange for a lifetime membership. One hundred and nineteen of those life members or 15% gave a donation to Ferry Beach last year. Eighty-six people are sustaining members of Ferry Beach, collectively giving about \$40,000 last year. About half of our sustaining members were also life members when they started giving monthly.

many years.

"You used to have to get up here early and talk to Ray if you wanted to get a good room," said another. There were no on-line registrations back then.

Reminiscing on the Quillen porch with people who had come to Ferry Beach for more than forty years, they shared how much the physical landscape had shifted as well. As we sat there, you could almost see the railroad tracks and the bowling alley that were on the beach side of Ferry Beach. The road on the ocean side of Quillen once went all the way to Camp Ellis and the row of houses that stood on the eastern side have been swallowed up the ocean.



Many people have seen each other's kids grow up to have kids of their own. One coordinator of a conference married his childhood Ferry Beach sweetheart and now they are bringing their young children to Ferry Beach. The weekend retreats on hot topics of the day,



which assembled people to talk about the Great Depression and World War II haven't happened in a long time.

The old Belmont burned down and was never put back up. Gone are the open walls that surrounded the GAYLA Theater. The Fire Marshall mandated we close the walls for safety. With them went the stories of children daring others to jump from the balcony into the auditorium below.

While old stories fade, new ones are created; new families have found their way to Ferry Beach. Their stories will be entwined with the stories from the past. Who knows, they might find a childhood sweetheart among a long time Ferry Beach family and start a family tradition of their own.
