In Retrospect: The DeWolfe Dining Hall

In retrospect, those first few conversations about building a new dining hall were prophetic and bold. At the time, Ferry Beach was struggling to keep up with the wind, sand, sun and salty sea air, which had taken their collective toll on our campus.

Fast forward through a capital campaign which built the dining hall as well as a major renovation that would move the three cabins which sat on the site into what is now the Metz Village and the restoration of the dune on the beach utilizing countless volunteer hours. By the time the Dining Hall building opened in 2011, Ferry Beach had taken on additional debt to bring the total close to a million dollars. While the building and the other renovations were occurring, we were neglecting the general maintenance and upkeep of the rest of our buildings and grounds, leaving more than a million dollars in deferred maintenance by the time the Dining Hall opened.

Yet what a glorious change the Dining Hall and the renovations that occurred concurrently have been! With major gifts from Bill and Barbara DeWolfe, Fayre Stephenson, (Eleanor Rowland kitchen) and Ruth Gitchell Rempt (the Gitchell porch), the building itself is a testament to a collaboration of gifts. The Metz Village, with a generous initial gift and ongoing gifts from the Metz family provides a deck, 2 cabins for guests and a lovely space for our year round caretaker. The rebuilding of the dunes has provided safety for our buildings. Many Ferry Beach members gave to the capital campaign and it truly was a group effort to sustain Ferry Beach for the future.

With a four season building in the middle of the campus, a modern kitchen, a large porch and seating for 175, the dining hall has given Ferry Beach opportunities to attract people to our facility that had not been here previously. It also has inspired other dreams and visions for other buildings on campus. The DeWolfe dining hall changed how Ferry Beach members see Ferry Beach.

The path to building the DeWolfe dining hall was not without challenges. A crisis in leadership at the board level early on coupled with the Executive Director also leaving created an opportunity to revamp the leadership of Ferry Beach. Paul Provencher, who had been the treasurer through the capital campaign, became the board president. He appointed a search committee to find new leadership of Ferry Beach at the staff level that could shepherd us out of the debt and deferred maintenance we had taken on as an organization. In June of 2012 the executive search committee chose Cathy Stackpole, to lead the organization.

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With an extensive background in not for profit organizations, Stackpole was charged by the board with addressing the enormous debt and deferred maintenance. Cutting staff, increasing giving and reducing the amount of events that Ferry Beach gave away started moving the needle from the red to the black. With the board's support and a new building to anchor its efforts, Ferry Beach began changing its business model.

Building a more robust summer season created increasing numbers of people coming to Ferry Beach. By 2015, with the support of two large legacy gifts, Ferry Beach was finally in the black after running deficits and increasing its borrowing for many years.

In 2013, the contract with our long-term tenant was up for renewal. Through the process, the board of the Beach realized that the cost of having the Ecology School here was increasing our debt load. Coupled with the knowledge that the school was here 65-70% of the time the Beach could be open while providing 12% of the income led to the conclusion that Ferry Beach would not renew the contract past its expiration in 2018.

When Ray Hopkins died in 2014, Ferry Beach created a small campaign to renovate the former residence into 4 ADA equipped rooms and bathrooms for persons with disabilities. This work was completed in 2016 with a generous gift from Tom Allison who suggested we name the property after his deceased partner, John Cross.

In the last few years, with increases in revenue through our concerted efforts to bring more people here to participate in summer conferences, and to build robust weekend shoulder season church retreats, Ferry Beach has been able to whittle away at its deferred maintenance. See sidebar...

Probably very little of this would have been accomplished without the building of the DeWolfe dining hall. Yes, it created the debt, which forced Ferry Beach to take a good hard look at its long-term contracts as well as its business model. But it also created the vision and the element of possibility that Ferry Beach needed to believe that it could move forward with its own mission, vision and values. It is interesting how one decision could cascade into a host of other activities and events, all of which has been beneficial to the long-term sustainability of Ferry Beach.

The **Metz Village** is a collection of private cabins that sleep up to 4 people, and have a living room, private bathroom, heat and air conditioning. The **Cross Cottage** contains private, hotel-style rooms that sleep 2 or 3 people, have private bathrooms and are heated / air conditioned. **Morris Cottage** sleeps up to 8 people in 4 bedrooms. Morris has a full service kitchen, living room, heat and air conditioning. **Kelly Cottage** is heated / air conditioned and sleeps up to 6 people in 3 bedrooms with 2 shared bathrooms, kitchen and living room.
