Winter on the coast in northern New England can be cruel, benevolent, ugly, beautiful, violent and serene. Sometimes, it is all of these in the course of a weekend, or even a day. The weekend of February 8th started ugly: deep fog, rain just bordering on freezing, which hit the streets and immediately iced. And dare I say damp? There is nothing more damp than rain drenched snow, freezing fog and ice coated trees that began to drip with the weight of the frozen dampness.

A full retreat scheduled, our guests were coming from elsewhere in New England so they weren't planning to cancel, "bring it on," they said. And so, she did. Mother Nature's howling winds stirred the ocean so much, that if the drip, drip, drip of the semi-frozen rain didn't make you grab your jacket tight around you, the roaring waves did.

In the blink of an eye, the internet went out. Happens all the time up here. Our summer guests complain about slow wi-fi, how about NO wi-fi, which occurs with some regularity. No big deal, until the power went out. To underscore that the power was out, the fire alarms sounded in the deepening dark, constantly reminding us that the power was out.

Guests who had already made it to campus conferred together and decided that even though they were New Englanders, this was too much. They had about an hour's drive in the rain changing to freezing rain to wintry mix to snow and they decided to head out. The staff of Ferry Beach changed their plans to work the weekend and headed out too, leaving faucets on in certain buildings.

All night long the sound of the wind shook my shoulders awake, and I dreamed of frozen pipes. In the early morning hours, unable to sleep anymore, I put my clothes on and went down to Ferry Beach. Two of the staff were already there, checking on the buildings and firing up two portable generators to keep two different indoor fire suppression systems operating (DeWolfe and Cross) as the temperature on my weather app read -0.

The ice that had built up on the trees, the streets and the grasses just laughed in the beautiful bright sun. Sky jewels everywhere, the sea glistened calm. The generators were going to be here, when we were not. They were small, with about 8-9 hours of run time, but they would give us just enough heat, we hoped to protect our sprinkler heads.

By late afternoon, I needed to check back on the generators. I was greeted by the beautiful full moon rising over the ocean, serene, calm and beautiful save for the loud hum of the generator. Another sleepless night, punctuated with the question: will the generator run out of gas too soon in the middle of the night and the pipes freeze?

In the chilly morning of the second day, the generator was off and covered with frost, but the inside temperature was 41 degrees. "Yes!" Some relief. By late afternoon of the waning weekend, the utility company was able to restore power.

While we are so grateful for the portable generators, we are putting the interior of the DeWolfe dining room and Cross Cottage at risk every time the power goes out. While we didn't venture into a life of immorality (from the Southern colloquialism of "breaking bad") we see clearly that the risk we are taking is more than we should to save money on buying generators for both buildings.




So Long Our Friend


